


# IS ACADEMIC CORRUPTION A WIDE SPREAD OR SERIOUS ISSUE?


- Studies worldwide indicate yes.

- "There is an urgent need for more applied, pragmatic remedies for corruption in academia."
- Example from the Study: Figure 20b: Possible interactions between students and professors
- My friend and I did not pass the exam, and the lecturer himself gave a hint to us that, well, we can pay a 'sponsorship fee' ... and the problem will be solved (male, student, 3rd year).
- I had to leave urgently, and I did not have as much time to prepare for the exam as I expected, so I went to the lecturer and explained. Without saying a word, he wrote a number on a piece of paper and I agreed (female, student, 3rd year).

#### Is Academic Corruption a Issue in Ukraine?

- Among 600 students at public universities in Lviv—
- 47.8 percent of students have experience with bribing;
- 94.5 percent of students admit that they cheat during exams and tests;
- 92.8 percent write papers by copying and pasting without acknowledging their sources;
- 64.2 percent download papers from internet and submit them as their own;
- 40.4 percent purchase papers from ghostwriters; and
- 37.5 percent ask faculty for preferential treatment."

If it is a Systemic Problem, How can Universities Hope to Prevent Academic Corruption?

- Meaningful Code of Conduct for entire University
- Develop meaningful and fair enforcement mechanisms
- Continual education on the ethical system
- Engage all parties into the ethics debate and solutions
- Consider launching an Honor System to create a "culture of honor"
